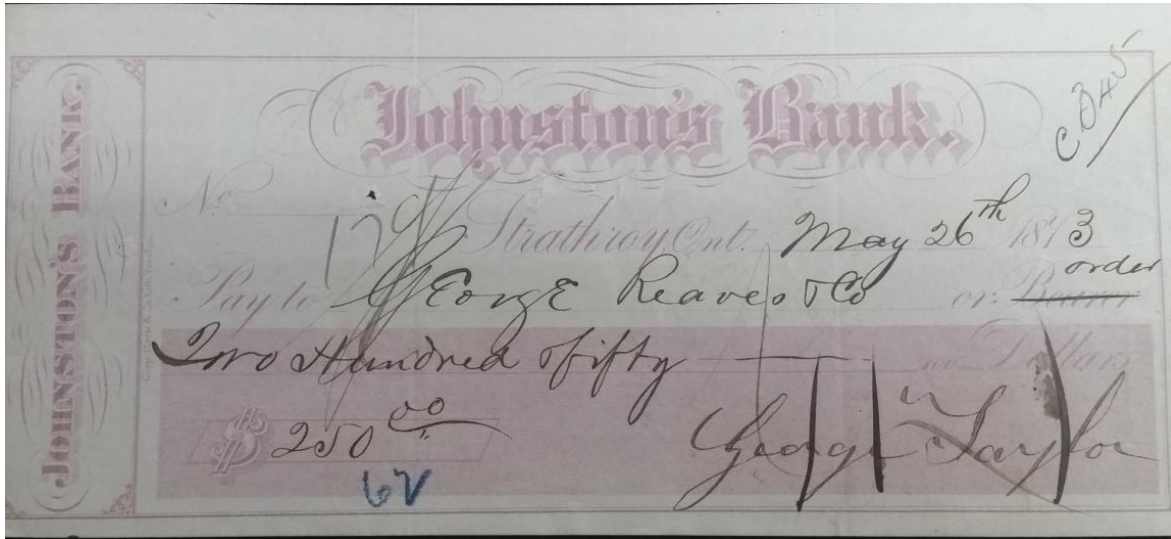

A DIFFERENT SIDE OF NUMISMATICS

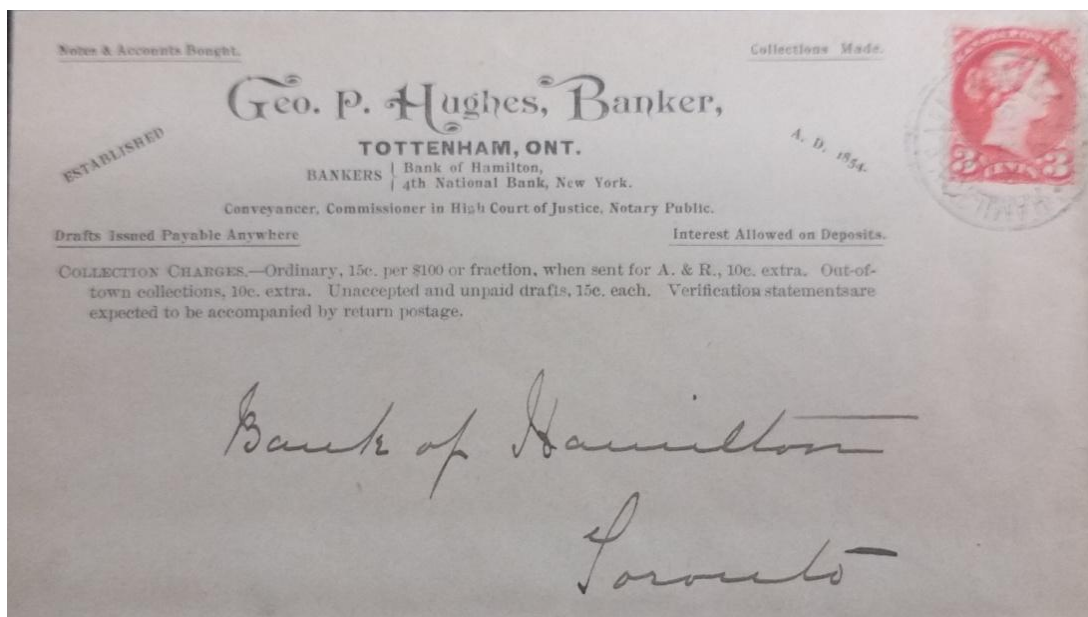

The collecting of Canadian Private Bank items is a fascinating off shut of the more popular Chartered Bank items. Canadian Private Bankers played a momentous role in Canada's economic development. Between 1870 and 1910 there were approximately 500 Private Banks and some had several branches as well. In rural areas the population preferred to deal with a local banker, as he was usually well known and a revered member of the community. To gain a foot

hold in rural areas the Chartered Banks began to buy out the Private Banks. As a result, almost all the Private Banks disappeared by the 1920s. Private Banks could not issue bank notes; however, there are many items to collect. Such as, cheques, deposit slips, letterheads, passbooks, envelopes, reply cards, newspaper ads, and directories. These countless sources are the preliminary listings found in the Canadian Bank Notes 8th edition (Charlton Standard Catalogue)
